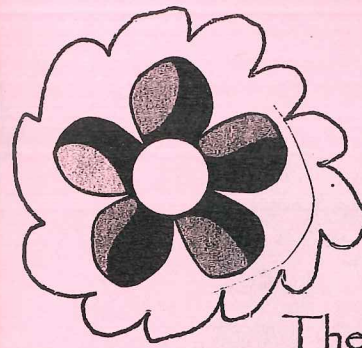
WAVE 3

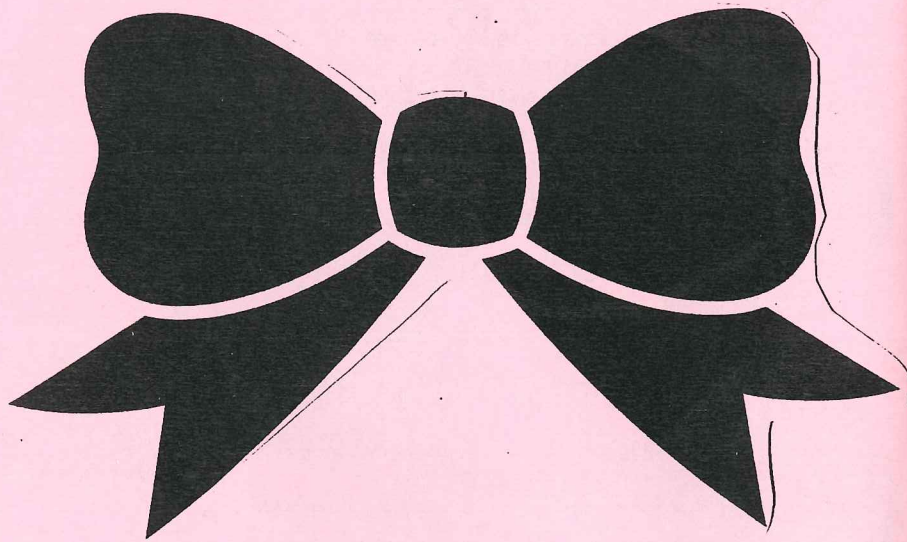

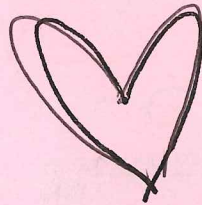
WAVE 4

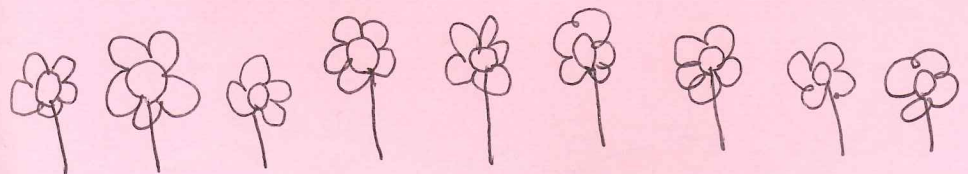
